Scripture Corner SIN AND REPENTANCE

In today's Gospel (Matthew 21:28-32) Jesus tells the parable of two sons. Matthew uses the situation to develop two of his special themes. First of all, there is the necessity of doing good and not just talking about it. The first son rejects his father's order. Later he thinks it over and repents and does what is asked of him. The second son says that he will carry out the father's order, but does not do it!

In the Sermon on the Mount Christ had stressed the need for action. "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only the one who does the will of my Father in heaven." (Matthew 7:21) Jesus reminded his audience that the tax collectors and prostitutes accepted John the Baptist, but the leaders did not. The leaders feared that the Baptist's influence with the people could cost them their special political and religious positions.

Another key theme of our Lord was that there was still time for repentance. The first son in the parable could still repent and find forgiveness. This is also true of the leaders. Jesus warns them "Amen, I say to you, tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the kingdom of God before you." (Matthew 21:31) In today's first reading (Ezekiel 18:25-28) the prophet speaks of forgiveness. "But if he turns from the wickedness he has committed, and does what is right and just, he shall preserve his life; since he has turned away from all the sins that he has committed, he shall surely live, he shall not die."

Our second reading today (Philippians 2:1-11) has a wonderful Christian hymn, honoring the SON of God! He was willing to assume our human nature with all its weaknesses, except sin. His humility led him to accept a terrible death for us. In return, his Father exalted him, bestowing on him the name LORD. Every tongue will confess to the glory of God the Father, JESUS CHRIST IS LORD.

THE MUSINGS OF THE PASTOR

Today is Respect Life Sunday. The Catholic Bishops of the United States initiated Respect Life Sunday in 1972, the year before the Supreme Court legalized abortion in the United States through their decision *Roe v. Wade*. The theme featured for this year (from October 2017 through September 2018) is *“Be Not Afraid.”* The program promotes respect for human life in light of our intrinsic dignity as having been created in God’s image and likeness and called to eternal destiny with him. One of the tasks of the Respect Life program is building a culture of life.

In order to understand how we can effectively build a culture of life, we need to consider that God created us in his image and likeness. Indeed the essence of our worth comes not from how much money we make, how much power we wield, or how much we can boast of our bloodline. No--the essence of our identity and worth, the source of dignity, is that we are loved by God. We are called to true communion with God and we can grow in this communion through daily prayer, reading the Scriptures, and frequent reception of the Sacraments, especially Confession and the Eucharist.

When someone we know is facing a great trial, we need to meet them where they are, we accompany them on their journey, we intercede for them, and we try to remain open to sharing Christ’s love with them however God directs us. Sometimes our actions speak for themselves. Other times, words are needed. In this context the words attributed to St. Francis of Assisi apply, *“Preach the Gospel on every occasion, and when necessary, use words.”* Jesus knows how to speak to the heart of each person. Our job is to follow where he leads.

This is our call as missionary disciples. Some, like Blessed Stanley Rother or Saint Marianne Cope are called to leave the comforts of home and to engage in missionary work in distant lands. Most of us are called, instead, to be missionary disciples right where we live. In living as missionary disciples of Christ we are engaged in promoting the Gospel of Life in the midst of the culture of death all around us. Changing the culture is a process of conversion that begins in our own hearts and includes a willingness to be instructed and close to Jesus, who is the source of our joy, our love, and our hope.

A simple and practical thing that we can do is to participate in the baby bottle campaign that will take place during this month of October. Our Respect Life Committee is organizing it. Last year we were able to give over \$3,000 to the Shady Grove Pregnancy Center through this effort. Our support helps them in their mission to help anyone who may be experiencing problems because of an unintended or unwanted pregnancy.

VACCINATION UPDATE

- Last year, 70 people from 16 states were reported to have measles.
- Mumps is no longer as common in the United States as it once was, but cases can range annually from a couple hundred to a couple thousand. Forty two states and the District of Columbia reported 2,570 mumps cases from Jan. 1 to April 22, 2017. In 2016, 5,311 cases were reported to the CDC.
- Up to date immunization records are required for entry into public schools.
- This year's flu vaccine is currently available in many retail locations such as CVS, Giant and Safeway

The Opioid Addiction Crisis

The Baltimore Sun recently reported that drug and alcohol related deaths in Maryland climbed 37 percent for a total of 550 overdose deaths in the first three months of this year. The biggest increase were in deaths related to persons taking opioids laced with the potent additive fentanyl, another powerful narcotic. The rapid rate of addiction and consequent rising death toll has left countless families and friends devastated in the wake of loss and grief. On a national level Maryland has federal approval to use Medicaid dollars for residential substance abuse treatment. On the state level, Governor Hogan has declared opioid addiction an epidemic and state wide public health emergency in Maryland. Consequently, Opioid Intervention Teams have been formed in all of Maryland's local jurisdictions so that the state and local health and emergency agencies can coordinate their prevention and protection efforts. The current opioid crisis has affected many families right here in our area as it has nationwide. Because it is central to our mission to bring hope and healing to the suffering in our midst a compassionate response to help families become informed and better equipped to cope with this crisis will be presented in October by the Health Ministry.
