### SACRAMENT OF THE ANOINTING OF THE SICK OFFERED AT DAILY MASS ON NOVEMBER 11

St. Francis of Assisi parish will offer the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick at 9:00 a.m. daily Mass on Saturday, November 11. The special grace of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick has as its effects:

- The uniting of the sick person to the Passion of Christ, for his or her own good and that of the whole Church.
- Giving the sick person the strength, peace, and courage to endure in a Christian manner the sufferings of illness or old age.
- Imparting the forgiveness of sins, if the sick person was not able to obtain it through the Sacrament of Penance.
- Providing for the restoration of health, if it is conducive to the salvation of the soul of the sick person.
- Helping the sick person in preparation for passing over to eternal life.

### THE MUSINGS OF THE PASTOR

On November 1, 2016, Pope Francis celebrated Mass in Malmo, Sweden at the end of an ecumenical trip to Sweden. In talking about the saints, the Holy Father said a number of things that I want to mention to us again, a little more than a year after he said them, because they are well worth hearing again.

Pope Francis remarked that the best description of the saints is found in the Beatitudes. He also said that Christ's followers today are called to confront the troubles and anxieties of our age with the spirit and love of Jesus, as Christian saints have done throughout the ages. Because our new situations require new energy and new commitment, Pope Francis offered a new list of Beatitudes for modern Christians:

*Blessed are they who remain faithful while enduring evils inflicted on them by others and forgive them from their heart.*

*Blessed are they who look into the eyes of the abandoned and marginalized and show them their closeness.*

*Blessed are those who see God in every person and strive to make others also discover him.*

*Blessed are those who protect and care for our common home.*

*Blessed are those who renounce their own comfort in order to help others.*

*Blessed are those who pray and work for full communion between Christians.*

Pope Francis commented that all these are messengers of God's mercy and tenderness. Surely, the Holy Father believes, they will receive from God their merited reward. I think that it can be helpful to look on these New Beatitudes as the priorities that Pope Francis has stressed for the four years that he has been pope: the importance of faithfulness and forgiveness, caring for those on the margins, reaching out to evangelize others, caring for the environment and integrated ecology, and furthering ecumenical efforts.

When I think of the recently Blessed Stanley Rother and Capuchin Father Solanus Casey who will be beatified later this month, I see them as individuals who lived out well this new list of Beatitudes. Blessed Stanley was certainly someone who remained faithful while enduring evils inflicted on him by others. One of his famous sayings was that the "Shepherd does not run at the first sign of danger." Father Solanus clearly looked into the eyes of the abandoned and showed them that God had not forgotten them or forsaken them.

Let's ask their prayers for us that we also may remain faithful in these difficult times when the culture of death threatens to overwhelm us. Let us continue to preach the Gospel on every occasion and, when necessary, use words.

### **SFA Hosts The Opioid Epidemic: A Compassionate Response**

On October 26, the St. Francis of Assisi Health Ministry and Catholic Charities co-hosted a community forum on “The Opioid Epidemic: A Compassionate Response” to address the affliction of substance abuse disorder sweeping the nation in staggering proportions.

Approximately 75 attendees heard a collective message from keynote speaker Dr. John Rosa and panelists that “it takes a village” to address the many challenges impacting the families affected by substance abuse. Dr. Rosa, an integrated medicine physician with Accessible Beltway Clinics, demonstrated how the overuse of legal prescription opioid drugs -- all rapidly causing physical addiction -- has created an unprecedented demand for opioids in ever increasing dosages. Legal distribution of prescription opioid drugs, coupled with illicit drug trafficking, has made the supply for opioids ample, cheap and lethal. This self-perpetuating vicious cycle has claimed the lives of more Americans in less than two years than the Vietnam War did in 20 years. The collateral damage for grieving families is incalculable.

Betty Baklarz, coordinator for the St. Francis Health Ministry, stressed the importance of building resiliency for life through strong faith and family bonds.

Panelists at the community forum included James Place Advocacy Group Founder Barbara Allen, who has lost three family members to opioid abuse; Judith Clarke of Women Who Care Ministries, who is 21 years in recovery; Fr. John Dillon; Dr. Rosa; and Lt. Ronald Smith of the Montgomery County Police Department. The panel addressed questions from the audience, stressing the need for a multi-disciplined response to this epidemic.

Ms. Allen explained her journey from grieving mother to executive director of James Place whose mission is to educate and provide scholarships for recovery services for the disease of addiction. She advised the use of a drug lockbox to safeguard prescription medicines at home and to dispose of unused prescription opioids through the county police department.

Ms. Clarke shared her recovery journey and outlined the services her ministry provides to care for women who are victims of abuse.

Dr. Rosa addressed the question of medical marijuana. Noting that there are mixed results as to whether marijuana is an effective treatment as some have claimed, Dr. Rosa stressed that there’s evidence marijuana may be a gateway drug to opioids. States that have legalized marijuana are experiencing employment and increased crime issues, he said.

Fr. Dillon explained the emotional challenges of working with families who have lost a loved one to an overdose.

Lt. Smith of the Montgomery County Police Department explained Maryland’s Good Samaritan law and encouraged persons to call for help for suspected overdose. The Good Samaritan Law protects persons from arrest or prosecution when calling 911 for help during an overdose crisis so that no charges for use or possession of a controlled dangerous substance or drug paraphernalia or for providing alcohol to minors will be incurred, according to the Maryland Department of Health’s Behavioral Health Administration.

The engaging question and answer discussion illustrated that the comprehensive approach to saving lives should include medical treatment, sustainable recovery programs, prevention education, effective public policy and law enforcement.
